Saint Cabrini Biography

Frances Xavier Cabrini, M.S.C. (Francesca Saverio Cabrini), also known as Mother Cabrini, was born on July 15th, 1850 in Italy. She was the youngest of the thirteen children of Agostino Cabrini and Stella Oldini, who were wealthy cherry tree farmers. Sadly, only four of the thirteen survived beyond adolescence. Born two months premature, she was small and weak as a child, and remained in delicate health throughout her life. At thirteen, Francesca attended a school run by the Daughters of the Sacred Heart. Five years later she graduated cum laude with a teaching certificate.

After the deaths of her parents in 1870, she became the headmistress of the House of Providence orphanage in Codogno, where she taught, and drew a small community of women to live a religious way of life.

Francesca Cabrini took religious vows in 1877 and added "Xavier" to her name to honor the

Jesuit Saint, Francis Xavier, the Patron Saint of Missionary Service. In November 1880, she and six other women founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus (M.S.C.), a Catholic religious institute which was a major support to Italian immigrants to the United States – and she began to be referred to as 'Mother Cabrini.' In September, 1877, Mother Cabrini went to seek approval of the pope to establish missions in China. Instead, he suggested she go to the United States to help the Italian immigrants who were flooding to that nation, mostly in great poverty. "Not to the East, but to the West" was his advice. She left for the United States, arriving in New York City on March 31st, 1889. In New York she encountered disappointment and difficulties, but obtained the permission of the archbishop to found an orphanage, which is located in West Park, New York and known as Saint Cabrini Home. Mother Cabrini organized catechism and education classes for immigrants. She established schools and orphanages despite tremendous odds. In New York City, she founded Columbus Hospital and Italian Hospital. In the 1980s, they were merged into Cabrini Medical Center.

In Chicago, the sisters opened Columbus Extension Hospital (later renamed Saint Cabrini Hospital) in the heart of the city's Italian neighborhood on the Near West Side. Their foundress' name lives on in Chicago's Cabrini Street. In 1909, she was naturalized as a United States citizen.

On December 22nd, 1917, while preparing Christmas candy for the local children, Mother Cabrini died of complications from dysentery at the age of 67. By that time, she had founded 67 missionary institutions (in New York; Chicago; Des Plaines; Illinois: Seattle; New Orleans; Denver & Golden, Colorado; Los Angeles; Philadelphia; and in countries throughout South America & Europe) to serve the sick.

Long after her death, the Missionary Sisters would achieve her goal of being missionaries to China but after a short time, with much social and religious upheaval there, the Sisters left China. She was beatified on November 13th, 1938, by Pope Pius XI.

Mother Cabrini was the first naturalized citizen of the United States to be canonized by the Roman Catholic Church, on

July 7th, 1946 by Pope Pius XII. In the United States, her Obligatory Memorial is celebrated on November 13th. She is the patron saint of Immigrants and hospital administrators.
